Lancasterian dominate at Goalball!





At the beginning of March, 6 of our KS3/4 students went to Levenshulme High school to take part in a Greater Manchester Goalball event. Goalball is a very competitive sport, where all the children have to wear a blind fold and take it in turns to throw the adapted ball into the opponent's goal and at the same time defend their own goal, all without the ability to see. The team played 6 matches during the competition and managed to win 3, draw 2 and only lost 1. As a result, the team won the overall event and will now go on to represent Greater Manchester at the finals during the summer term.





Oak class visited Alderley Edge to begin preparations for their D of E expedition. Prior to the day the class had to discuss and agree a set of instructions that would be needed to make the day successful. This included preparation of lunches, agreeing on suitable





clothing and ensuring that first aid and medication was taken to keep them safe whilst on the walk. They had a fantastic day, the weather was kind and they managed to walk over 2 and a half miles! 
I have the right to good quality health care, to clean water and good food.
